City of Santee Salary Setting Advisory Committee Overview

- The Santee City Charter was approved by voters in November 2008, at which time the Salary Setting Advisory Committee was officially established.
- The Purpose/Responsibility of the committee is <u>advisory</u> in nature:
 - To make recommendations regarding the appropriate level of salary and benefits for the Mayor and the City Council.
- By law, there are two processes the City can take to set Mayor and Council salaries:
 - 1. Salary Setting Advisory Committee (City Charter, §400)
 - a. The Committee must first make a recommendation before the Council can act to adjust the salaries in a manner not expressly authorized by state law.
 - b. Council does not have to approve the Committee's recommendation; Council can set salaries different from the recommendation but only after receiving the recommendation.
 - c. Salary increases can take effect immediately or be set for a specific date in the future. For example, increases could take effect July 1st to coincide with the City's fiscal year.
 - 2. State Law (Government Code section 36516) Update effective January 1, 2024
 - a. Does not require a recommendation from the Committee.
 - b. Allows for regular salary adjustments, not to exceed 5% for each calendar year from the date of the last adjustment (but cannot be compounded). **OR** an amount equal to inflation since January 1, 2024, based upon the California Consumer Price Index, which shall not exceed 10 percent for each calendar year.
 - c. Cannot provide automatic future increases, must adopt a new ordinance.
 - d. A change in compensation does not apply to a council member during the council member's term of office.
- The Committee is free to consider the following factors and/or other relevant factors when making its recommendation:
 - 1. Follow Government Code section 36516.
 - 2. Conduct a salary survey and consider the salaries paid to similarly situated individuals in the area, the duties and burdens placed on the officials.
 - 3. Other relevant factors

Charter of the City of Santee

PREAMBLE

We, the people of the City of Santee, intend to preserve in our community the fundamental principles of local self-governance inherent in the doctrine of home-rule. We firmly believe that local government best represents the needs of our community, and that an independent local government will best serve and promote the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Santee. Therefore, we wish to exercise the express right granted by the Constitution of the State of California and ordain and establish this Charter for the City of Santee.

ARTICLE I MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS

Section 100. Powers of the City

The City shall have full power and authority to adopt, make, exercise and enforce all legislation, laws and regulations with respect to municipal affairs, subject only to the limitations and restrictions as may be provided in this Charter, in the Constitution of the State of California and in the laws of the United States.

Section 101. Municipal Affairs

Each of the matters set forth in this Charter are declared to be municipal affairs, consistent with the laws of the State of California. The implementation of each matter uniquely benefits the citizens of the City of Santee and addresses peculiarly local concerns within the City of Santee. The municipal affairs set forth in this Charter are not intended to be an exclusive list of municipal affairs over which the City Council may govern, and the City Council may, by ordinance or resolution, regulate other municipal affairs as it may from time to time deem necessary.

Section 102. Incorporation and Succession

The City shall continue to be a municipal corporation known as the City of Santee. The boundaries of the City of Santee shall continue as now established, until changed in the manner authorized by law. The City shall remain vested with and shall continue to own, have, possess, control and enjoy all property rights and rights of action of every nature and description owned, had, possessed, controlled or enjoyed by it at the time this Charter is legally established. The City shall be subject to all debts, obligations and liabilities of the City of Santee existing at the time this Charter is legally established. All lawful ordinances, resolutions, rules and regulations, or portions thereof, existing at the time this Charter is legally established and not in conflict with or inconsistent with this Charter shall continue in full force and effect until they have been repealed, amended, changed or superseded by proper lawful action.

ARTICLE II FORM OF GOVERNMENT

Section 200. Form of Government

The form of municipal government established by this Charter shall be known as the "Council-Manager" form of government. The City Council shall establish the policy of the City and the City Manager shall carry out that policy.

ARTICLE III FISCAL MATTERS

Section 300. No Public Financing of Election Campaigns

The City shall not provide for the financing, with public funds, of any election campaigns for any elected offices within the City.

Section 301. No Gifts of Public Funds.

The City shall not make a gift of public funds in a manner inconsistent with the provisions of the Constitution of the State of California and the laws of the State of California as applicable to general law cities in the State of California.

Section 302. Prevailing Wages.

The City shall require the payment of prevailing wages on City public works projects in the same manner as is required of general law cities in the State of California; provided, however, that the City Council may, by a resolution or ordinance adopted by a four-fifths (4/5) vote of the City Council, increase or decrease the minimum thresholds which trigger the requirement to pay prevailing wages for individual projects, categories of projects or all City public works projects.

ARTICLE IV COMMITTEES

Section 400. Salary Setting Advisory Committee

The City Council shall, from time to time, establish a Salary Setting Advisory Committee to make recommendations regarding the appropriate level of salary and benefits for the Mayor and the City Council. The City Council may establish the appropriate composition, membership and procedures for the Salary Setting Advisory Committee. The City Council shall not adjust the salary and benefits of the Mayor or the City Council in a manner not otherwise expressly authorized by the laws of the State of California applicable to general law cities unless and until it establishes the Salary Setting Advisory Committee and receives a recommendation from the Committee.

ARTICLE V REVENUE RETENTION

Section 500. Reductions Prohibited

Revenues owing to, raised by and collected by the City shall not be subject to subtraction, retention, attachment, withdrawal or any other form of involuntary reduction by any other level of government. Such revenues shall be subject to appropriation solely by the City Council.

Section 501. Mandates Limited

No person, whether elected or appointed, acting on behalf of the City, shall be required to implement or give effect to any function which is mandated by any other level of government, unless and until funds sufficient for the performance of such function are provided by such other level of government.

ARTICLE VI GENERAL LAWS

Section 600. General Law Powers

In addition to the powers and authority granted by the terms of this Charter and the

Constitution of the State of California, the City shall have the power and authority to adopt, make, exercise and enforce all legislation, laws and regulations and to take all actions and to exercise any and all rights, powers and privileges established, granted or prescribed by any law of the State of California or by any other lawful authority. In the event of any conflict between the provisions of this Charter and the provisions of the general laws of the State of California, the provisions of this Charter shall control.

ARTICLE VII INTERPRETATION

Section 700. Construction and Interpretation

The language contained in this Charter is intended to be permissive rather than exclusive or limiting and shall be liberally and broadly construed in favor of the exercise by the City of its power to govern with respect to any matter which is a municipal affair.

Section 701. Severability

If any provision of this Charter should be held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or otherwise unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall continue in full force and effect to the fullest extent permitted by law.

ARTICLE VIII AMENDMENT

Section 800. Amendment, Revision or Repeal

This Charter, or any of its provisions, may be amended by a majority vote of the electors voting on the question. Amendment, revision or repeal of this Charter, or any of its provisions, may be proposed by initiative or by the City Council.

Government Code Section 36516

(Guide to salaries and benefits for Mayor and Council for General Law Cities)

<u>36516</u>.

- (a) (1) A city council may enact an ordinance providing that each member of the city council shall receive a salary based on the population of the city as set forth in paragraph (2).
 - (2) The salaries approved by ordinance under paragraph (1) shall be as follows:
 - (A) In cities up to and including 35,000 in population, up to and including nine hundred fifty dollars (\$950) per month.
 - (B) In cities over 35,000 up to and including 50,000 in population, up to and including one thousand two hundred seventy-five dollars (\$1,275) per month.
 - (C) In cities over 50,000 up to and including 75,000 in population, up to and including one thousand six hundred dollars (\$1,600) per month.
 - (D) In cities over 75,000 up to and including 150,000 in population, up to and including one thousand nine hundred dollars (\$1,900) per month.
 - (E) In cities over 150,000 up to and including 250,000 in population, up to and including two thousand five hundred fifty dollars (\$2,550) per month.
 - (F) In cities over 250,000 population, up to and including three thousand two hundred dollars (\$3,200) per month. (A) In cities up to and including 35,000 in population, up to and including three hundred dollars (\$300) per month.
 - (3) For the purposes of this subdivision, the population of a city shall be determined by the last preceding federal census, or a subsequent census, or estimate validated by the Department of Finance.
 - (4) The salary of council members may be increased beyond the amount provided in this subdivision by an ordinance or by an amendment to an ordinance, but the amount of the increase shall not exceed the greater of either of the following:
 - (A) An amount equal to 5 percent for each calendar year from the operative date of the last adjustment of the salary in effect when the ordinance or amendment is enacted.
 - (B) An amount equal to inflation since January 1, 2024, based upon the California Consumer Price Index, which shall not exceed 10 percent for each calendar year.
 - (5) No ordinance shall be enacted or amended to provide automatic future increases in salary.

- (b) Notwithstanding subdivision (a), at any municipal election, the question of whether city council members shall receive a salary for services, and the amount of that salary, may be submitted to the electors. If a majority of the electors voting at the election favor it, all of the council members shall receive the salary specified in the election call. The salary of council members may be increased beyond the amount provided in this section or decreased below the amount in the same manner.
- (c) Unless specifically authorized by another statute, a city council may not enact an ordinance providing for compensation to city council members in excess of that authorized by the procedures described in subdivisions (a) and (b). For the purposes of this section, compensation includes payment for service by a city council member on a commission, committee, board, authority, or similar body on which the city council member serves. If the other statute that authorizes the compensation does not specify the amount of compensation, the maximum amount shall be one hundred fifty dollars (\$150) per month for each commission, committee, board, authority, or similar body.
- (d) Any amounts paid by a city for retirement, health and welfare, and federal social security benefits shall not be included for purposes of determining salary under this section, provided that the same benefits are available and paid by the city for its employees.
- (e) Any amounts paid by a city to reimburse a council member for actual and necessary expenses pursuant to Section 36514.5 shall not be included for purposes of determining salary pursuant to this section.
- (f) A city council member may waive any or all of the compensation permitted by this section.
- (g) (1) For the purposes of this section, a city council shall consider the adoption of an ordinance to increase compensation in open session during at least two regular meetings of the city council.
 - (2) At the first meeting, the city council shall present the proposed ordinance, which shall include findings demonstrating the need for the increased compensation. The ordinance shall not be adopted at the first meeting.
 - (3) At least seven days after the first meeting, the city council shall hold a second meeting to consider whether to adopt the ordinance.
- <u>36516.1</u>. A mayor elected pursuant to Sections 34900 to 34904, inclusive, may be provided with compensation in addition to that which he or she receives as a council member. That additional compensation may be provided by an ordinance adopted by the city council or by a majority vote of the electors voting on the proposition at a municipal election.
- <u>36516.5</u>. A change in compensation does not apply to a councilman during his term of office; however, the prohibition herein expressed shall not prevent the adjustment of the compensation of all members of a council serving staggered terms whenever one or more members of such council becomes eligible for a salary increase by virtue of his beginning a new term of office.

Salary Setting Advisory Committee BYLAWS

ARTICLE I: PURPOSE

The purpose of the Salary Setting Advisory Committee is to make recommendations to the Santee City Council regarding the appropriate level of salary and benefits for the Mayor and Council Members.

ARTICLE II: MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Committee Membership

The Salary Setting Advisory Committee will be comprised of seven (7) members.

Section 2. Appointment of Members

Members will be appointed by the City Council. Members must be residents of the City of Santee. No voting member may be an employee or an elected official of the City of Santee.

Section 3. Officers

A Chair and Vice-Chair will be elected by the Committee from among its members to serve a two-year term. The Chair, or Vice Chair in his/her absence, will present the Committee's recommendations to the City Council at a regularly scheduled public Council Meeting.

ARTICLE III: MEETINGS

Section 1. Time and Place

The Committee will meet every two years in the odd numbered years, unless otherwise directed by City Council. The Committee will meet and conclude its recommendation no later than the month of May in preparation of a recommendation to the City Council in June, in conjunction with the City's regularly scheduled budget preparation process for the upcoming fiscal year. Meetings will be held at City Hall.

Section 2. Legal Requirements

Meetings of the Committee are subject to the public meeting rules of the California Government Code, including the Brown Act. Reports and written materials of the Committee are subject to the California Public Records Act.

Section 3. Quorum

A quorum will consist of a majority of the members of the Committee. No business shall be transacted unless a quorum is present.

Section 4. Voting

Each Committee member, including the Chair and Vice-Chair, will have one (1) vote. In case of a tie vote, the motion fails.
